Professor Metzger was recently elected to the Council of the ABA Section of Administrative Law and Regulatory Practice and is a Senior Fellow of the Administrative Conference of the United States, where she was a Public Member from 2010–2017. She has filed briefs at the Supreme Court and lower courts in a number of high profile cases. Prior to coming to Columbia in 2001, Professor Metzger served as a law clerk to Justice Ginsburg of the U.S. Supreme Court and Judge Wald on the D.C. Circuit, and worked as a staff attorney at the Brennan Center for Justice.

Collectively called the Animal Abuse Statute Overhaul bill, Libre's Law was signed into law by Gov. Wolf in 2017. The law "updates and clarifies the existing animal abuse statute and increases penalties for abusing any animal," according to a statement from the Humane Society.

The new law also creates a clear delineation among summary offenses, misdemeanors and felony charges, and for the first time allow felony charges in cases other than animal fighting and killing an endangered species.
